Methodology


- Echelon Insights conducted a national online survey among registered voters in the likely electorate.
- The survey was conducted between April 25-27, 2023.
- The survey was conducted among N=1,012 voters.
- The margin of sampling error is +/- 4.0 percentage points.

Voters agree there should be limits on what the plaintiffs' attorneys can make from the veterans.


