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

### Almost four-in-five Missouri voters say the number of lawsuits is a serious problem.


Do you think the number of lawsuits is a...

Number of Lawsuits Opinion By Party and Ethnicity








## In fact, voters in every region of the state say the number of lawsuits is a problem.



And do you think out country would be better off or worse off if there were more limits on when and how lawsuits could be filed, or would it have little impact on our country?




### Voters opt for significant change when asked to rate how much change there should be to the lawsuit system.

## Two-thirds say the primary beneficiary of the lawsuit system is lawyers; victims and consumers are in single digits.




Who do you think benefits most from the current lawsuit system in MO?

Trial Lawyers Image



#### And think the views of trial lawyers are being taken into account more than small business in Jeff City.


Views Currently Taken Into Account





#### But that's not what they want - nine-in-ten say business' views should be taken into account.








Those strong attitudes exist even before hearing additional information about the lawsuit system in the state. At the end of the survey, we asked voters how certain facts affected their views.

#### Four-in-five voters are concerned about lawsuits coming in from Madison County.

Neighboring Madison County Illinois, is known as friendly courts for lawsuits, so much so that more than 98 percent of plaintiffs in their courts come from outside of the county.

Now, some of these same plaintiff's lawyers are bringing these out-of-state lawsuits to St. Louis County courts, even though very few of the companies being sued are located here in Missouri.






#### Three-in-five support making Missouri expert testimony standards consistent with that of federal courts.






#### A majority of voters support this alignment with federal standards.


Admission Of Expert Testimony By Gender/Age





#### Majorities of ethnic sub-groups also share this view.








#### Support is actually strongest among Democrats, but a majority of GOP and independents say the same.


#### <u>Admission Of Expert Testimony By Party</u>

### After hearing arguments on both sides of the issue, voters support change by more than two-to-one margin.

People who support these rules say that they will ensure that the science presented to juries meets the stronger federal standards and is presented by true experts, ensuring that innocent people are not convicted on the basis of so-called junk science. It could also help make Missouri courts more efficient by reducing unnecessary time evaluating the credentials of expert witnesses.

People who oppose these rules say that this change will only help big corporations who want to thwart victims from being able to properly present their cases in court, reduce their options for being able to present evidence to further help their case, and actually drag cases out longer costing everyone more.



# There is even stronger support for a proposal to rein in lawsuit lending in the state; three-quarters strongly support.

Today, there is a growing industry of lending companies that advance money to a plaintiff in a lawsuit, to cover such things as their housing or medical care, while their case proceeds. The lender receives their money back, plus interest, out of the settlement or award if the plaintiff wins or settles the case. That interest can be up to 200 percent for some loans, so one proposal is to limit the amount of interest that lenders can charge.
